Admission Policy

(Acceptance of New Students)

OKIU seeks individuals who agree with the university's motto and philosophy, who aim to become the type of person described in the university's mission statement, and who possess the interest, motivation, basic academic abilities, and communication skills necessary to develop the capabilities outlined in our educational objectives.

Diploma Policy

(Degree Conferment)

Students who possess the following qualities will be granted a bachelor's degree after completing the specified curriculum:

- (1) Diverse perspectives and specialized knowledge required for a deeper understanding of the society in which they live.
- (2) The capability to discover issues on their own and solve them through self-determination and cooperation.
- (3) Independence and awareness of their own social responsibilities.

I had a hard time adapting to the differences in culture, language, and environment, and since I had never studied Japanese, I had a difficult time communicating. One day, I got the lowest score among my friends on a placement test, so I felt ashamed and lost confidence. However, I started studying with enthusiasm, so I could achieve my dream of getting into Okinawa International University. One day, I was given the opportunity to take the university's entrance exam. After passing the exam and becoming a student, I felt lucky to receive such an extraordinary opportunity.

Okinawa International University has provided me with a lot of experience and broad insights, especially into culture and languages. I took the Communication Course in the Department of British and American Language and Culture. I also noticed that traditional fashion in Okinawa has similarities to traditional Indonesian fashion. *Bingata* is a traditional dyed craft in Okinawa. Interestingly, this craft has similarities to Indonesian *batik*. I took an Okinawan history class and did some research about *bingata* and discovered that yes, indeed, *bingata* has been influenced by Indonesian *batik*. I was moved to discover this cultural link between my country and Okinawa.

Okinawa has many beautiful white sand beaches, tasty food, and a lot of interesting culture to discover. No wonder Okinawa passed Hawaii in the number of tourists in 2017, when it attracted 9.25 million domestic and international visitors! While in Okinawa, I took the opportunity to experience working in the tourism industry and to learn more about Japanese hospitality by working in a restaurant in a Hilton resort in Okinawa.

Okinawa has a warm climate, and it is a nice place to live with people who are warm and friendly. I have also met many international students: from South Korea, Nepal, Peru, Bolivia, America, Macau, Taiwan and France. Curriculum Overview

Providing a Broad Range of Subjects for Students Who Want to Learn

Here at Okinawa International University, we value your desire to learn. In stark contrast to your time in high school, as a college student, you'll need to have a plan for your studies and activities. You'll need to think about how you'll use your limited time and resources when selecting the subjects that you need. At Okinawa International University, the curriculum is broadly divided into Specialized Subjects and General Subjects. Specialized Subjects are subjects offered by the various departments. These are subjects for acquiring the specialized knowledge specific to each of the departments. General Subjects are subjects divided into broad topics that will help you acquire the knowledge, skills, and culture required of educated adult members of society. These are subjects that students from any department can take.

Admission Policy (Acceptance of New Students)

The Department of Law aims to train individuals with legal minds that can logically and reasonably examine actual problems in society, and come up with flexible and appropriate solutions. The department therefore seeks individuals with the following characteristics:

- 1. Applicants who have a broad interest in and knowledge of the workings of
- 2. Applicants who can examine issues flexibly and logically, and who can clearly express their own opinions.
- 3. Applicants who can listen to various opinions and then put in the effort to arrive at appropriate solutions. For this reason, we seek motivated applicants with fortitude, high ambition and a strong sense of justice, and who are found suitable as described below.



The Department of Law aims to train law professionals who have acquired a thorough understanding of individual laws and the overall justice system. Through the four-year program, students will develop a legal mind and become law professionals who can grapple with various legal problems that arise in the real world.

Department Characteristics

As part of the only College of Law in Okinawa, the Department of Law provides a specialized curriculum to train professionals with a solid grounding in law.

- 1. Students acquire a broad and deep understanding of law, relating to everyday life, business, international relations, and other fields.
- 2. Students develop a deep respect for social norms, and acquire a strong foundation of knowledge for dealing with corporate law and issues of compliance (the observance of laws and ordinances).
- 3. Students develop an international outlook, connecting Okinawa to the world, as a result of their understanding of international law, foreign law, and diplomacy.







Curriculum Summary

In their first two years, students acquire a basic understanding of law by taking Introduction to Law and other required subjects that focus on the constitutional, civil, and criminal law code sections of the Six Codes (Japanese Constitution I, Civil Law General Provisions, and Introduction to Criminal Law). After this, students study the three remaining sections of the Six Codes (the commercial, civil procedure, and criminal procedure codes), in addition to other fields of law, such as administrative law, social law, international law, and legal theory. In addition, students can choose from various subjects in the field of political science, depending on their interests and critical concerns. Students are also required to take small group seminars, in which they research and present on their own topics of interest. In their first- and second-year seminars, students study broadly about problems in law and political science, and from their third year, they study more deeply about individual laws. Through this curriculum, the department aims to train professionals who can think and debate like lawyers.

Admission Policy (Acceptance of New Students)

The Department of Regional Administration seeks applicants who want to study in the fields of law, politics, and public administration in order to expand their views and outlooks, and become future leaders who can contribute to the development of the local community. In accepting applicants, the department will especially place emphasis on the following points:

- 1. Whether the applicant possesses a strong interest in national and international affairs and in what happens in the local community, a strong will and desire to contribute to the local community through local government and private business, an individual plan for the future, and the ability to take the initiative.
- 2. Whether the applicant can recognize regional problems, and come up with solutions through logical thinking, based on knowledge already acquired.
- 3. Whether the applicant has their own ideas when engaged in looking for solutions, can expand the discussion by exchanging opinions with others, and come up with specific results.
- 4. Whether the applicant has experience in appealing to people with various values, and can cooperate with others in order to achieve a goal.
- 5. Whether in Japanese and social studies subjects, the applicant acquired the reading, writing, and other basic high school skills that are prerequisite for improving one's ability at discerning and finding solutions for contemporary social issues.





Training professionals dedicated to clarifying and solving regional problems

The Department of Regional Administration ideally aims to broaden interest in law, politics, economics, and local government, while training professionals active in various areas of benefit to the public. The department emphasizes practical and on-hands learning in Okinawa and trains leaders with broad outlooks and deep understanding.



Department Characteristics

The department helps students deepen their understanding of the needs of local citizens while staying focused on Okinawa's public concerns, and encourages students to clarify their future visions of the local community and public administration.

- 1. As part of the College of Law, students learn to think logically and make sound judgments on their own, so that they'll be able to help create a just community.
- 2. Students gain a deeper understanding of the local reality, Japan, and the world, by first directly confronting Okinawan issues, such as the US military bases, the regional economy, employment, welfare, and international marriage and divorce.
- 3. Students rediscover the value of human interaction and local involvement through first-hand experiences and practice, and thereby develop their own ideas about administrative policy.

Curriculum Summary

In their first-year seminar, students will develop a productive learning-stye in a small-group atmosphere by researching, reading, understanding, making presentations, and expressing themselves. The seminar also helps student deepen their ties with the classmates they'll be studying with over the next four years. In Administrative Affairs I and II, students don't only acquire knowledge through book learning; they also get to hear from former and current government employees, and other experts with experience in politics and administrative affairs. From their second year, students will deepen their understanding of local government, public administration, policy process, and public works. Through the department's unique curriculum, students will study law, administration, and politics in order to acquire the ability to discern and analyze hidden social problems, so that they can develop ideas and policies to improve the local community.

Admission Policy (Acceptance of New Students)

The Department of Economics seeks individuals with the educational and research goals of contributing to local autonomy or the development of the global community, and who possess the basic knowledge, analytic skills, and ability in expression required of adults to solve various problems. The department therefore desires individuals with the following qualities:

- 1. Applicants with a strong interest in the various problems facing the local and global communities, including the economy.
- 2. Applicants with a desire to acquire the extensive knowledge needed to come up with solutions to those problems.
- 3. Applicants who can consider those problems logically and independently, and who have the desire to take action.
- 4. Applicants who want to apply economics and the knowledge of related fields in playing an active role in society.
- 5. Applicants who possess the basic high school academic abilities that are needed to study economics and related social science fields.



In the Department of Economics, students learn about basic economic theory and current conditions, as well as research ways to enhance and improve our economic lives. Through its rich and diverse curriculum and information-focused education for the understanding of the economy and society, the department aims to train professionals who can put their comprehensive knowledge to use in various fields. Japan's economy and society has changed as a result of globalization, progress in information technology, and an aging population, and these changes have had a major impact on our personal lives and the local community. This is also a time of tremendous technological development, along with corresponding innovation. We can't afford to stand bewildered in the face of such changes. Understanding the risks and opportunities from an economic point of view will prove to be extremely beneficial as we navigate our way through these turbulent times. The Department of Economics offers a curriculum that will help students respond to the diverse needs of society and that will match their interests and goals.







Department Characteristics

The department offers a broad and flexible curriculum with practical information education.

Curriculum Summary

In Introduction to Economics, students will learn about Okinawa's economy, the characteristics of various economic fields, and the usefulness of economic knowledge. Through a systematically organized curriculum, students acquire an appreciation of economics while learning how to study. As students progress through their course of study, they gradually deepen their interest in their field of specialization. In choosing subjects for pursuing that goal, students can consult with their academic advisor at any time. In addition, the department offers career support, in cooperation with Okinawa Prefecture's Career Center, thereby helping students to gain employment with companies or to pass the employment exams for civil service or teaching.

The Department of Regional Economics and Environmental Policy aims to train individuals who can contribute to the development of regional economies while considering impacts on the environment, and who can help create a sustainable society through an economic consideration of local communities and the environment. The department therefore seeks applicants who can explain in their own words how they possess the following characteristics:

- 1. Applicants with a broad interest in the problems and solutions relating to the economy and environment of Okinawa and the world.
- 2. Applicants who are interested in Okinawa's past, present, and future, and who strongly desire to contribute to the regional community.
- 3. Applicants who are interested in what takes place in society and who enjoy being active in the field.
- 4. Applicants who possess the basic academic ability needed to take university classes and who have the desire to study hard.



The Department of Regional Economics and Environmental Policy combines the study of regional economics, which searches for solutions to local economic problems, with environmental policy, which crafts policies that create environmental standards desirable to human society. The department aims to train professionals who can contribute to society through a deep understanding of environmental conservation and the use of resources, based on economics.

People tend to see environmental problems as being a concern for natural science, but the real cause of these problems is the strain placed on the environment by the lifestyles of people living in modern society, characterized by mass production, mass consumption, and massive amounts of waste. For this reason, most environmental problems are caused by economic activity. Consequently, approaching such problems through a fusion of regional economics and environmental policy can be extremely beneficial.







The stated goal of the department is "to train insightful specialists who can contribute to the creation of a recycling-oriented community that can achieve sustainable growth as a diverse modern society in the twenty-first century." With this goal in mind, we offer a rich educational program that meets the needs of the local community. By learning about the local economy, culture, history, and natural environment, and examining the immediate surroundings, you'll be able to deepen your understanding of regional economics and environmental policy.

Department Characteristics

The department offers a diverse curriculum based on the fundamentals of economics and with many subjects relating to the environment.

- 1. Students have freedom and flexibility in choosing subjects, to help them find their career paths.
- 2. Students learn about environmental problems and the latest economic trends in Okinawa, Japan, and the world.
- 3. Students learn about basic economic theories, application, and practice through a systematically organized curriculum.
- 4. Students are encouraged to widen and deepen their outlooks through a consideration of regional and environmental economics.
- 5. Students can take practical subjects for dealing with globalization and changes in information technology.
- 6. Students are offered subjects to help them acquire various licenses and certificates.
- 7. Students learn about theories and practices for improving the environment through economic activities.
- 8. Education and research in the department has been enriched through collaboration with the Graduate School of Regional Business and Economics.

Curriculum Summary

In their first year, students take the required subjects of Regional Economics I and II, in which they learn about the local economy, and Environmental Economics I and II, in which they learn about economic solutions to environmental problems. By taking specialized elective subjects, students deepen their knowledge of Okinawa's economic and environmental concerns, and acquire the ability to contribute to the local community. In their third year, students choose seminars for pursuing their own interests, and in their fourth-year seminars, they write a graduation thesis summarizing the results of their investigations and research. Through this curriculum, students acquire a wide range of knowledge and culture.

Department of Industry and Information Science

Admission Policy (Acceptance of New Students)

The Department of Industry and Information Science aims to train international specialists who have acquired a practical knowledge in the basics and specialized areas of industrial economics and the information sciences, and who will be pioneers in our highly advanced information society. Students will pursue a specialized and systematic study of the three fields of information, economics, and language study in order to become professionals who can play an active role in global businesses. Specifically, the department will train and produce individuals with the following abilities:

- 1. Individuals who can analyze problems in business, industry, and economics, and who can make proposals for solutions in the local and global communities.
- 2. Individuals who have acquired a comprehensive knowledge of information technology, who have learned advanced programming and system design, and who have the ability to make advances in digital content design and management.
- 3. Individuals who understand various cultures and who possess the communicative ability, business acumen, and problem-solving skills needed in global businesses.
- 4. Individuals who can apply their knowledge of information science, economics, and languages, who are aware of their social responsibilities, and who can contribute to the local community.

The Department of Industry and Information Science trains information technology specialists who have acquired economic knowledge with a global perspective. Department of Japanese Language and Culture

Admission Policy (Acceptance of New Students)

The Department of Japanese Language and Culture has the educational goal of furthering scholarship on Japanese culture and Ryukyuan culture. Specifically, the department carries out theoretical and practical education focusing on language and literature, with the aim of training intelligent individuals who are deeply aware of their roles in the local, online, and global communities, who can enthusiastically perform in society, and who possess analytical ability, information-processing ability, the power of expression, communicative competence, and the ability to coexist with others. In accord with the department goals discussed above and Okinawa International University's admission policy, the Department of Japanese Language and Culture seeks applicants with the following qualities:

- 1. Applicants who have an interest and desire to independently learn about language and literature, focusing on Japanese culture and Ryukyuan culture, in addition to learning about various modes of communication demanded during the global era.
- 2. Applicants who possess the basic academic abilities needed to pursue studies in the areas mentioned in the previous point.



In the Department of Japanese Language and Culture, students study a wide range of cultural topics related to Okinawa and Japan, including language, literature, and the performing arts. Students also learn to improve various other skills needed to share Okinawan and Japanese culture with the increasingly globalized world of today: information and communications technology (ICT) skills, the ability to understand local communities, and foreign-language communication skills. In addition, with the goal of becoming language professionals, students undergo repeated training in reading, writing, and speaking, so that they acquire cultural knowledge, critical thinking and expression skills, and a capacity for self-realization. As a result, they become self-reliant and productive adults, professionals, and world citizens.







Department Characteristics

The department provides students with a broad-based and in-depth study of the cultures of Okinawa (Ryukyu) and Japan, and helps them acquire the knowledge, skills, and sensibility needed to describe and share that knowledge with the global community.

- 1. Students study the language, literature, and performing arts of Okinawa and Japan.
- 2. Students learn to research, read, evaluate, and express their ideas through active learning and individualized instruction in small-group seminars.

Department of Society and Regional Culture

Admission Policy (Acceptance of New Students)

The Department of Society and Regional Culture, in accord with Okinawa International University's admission policy, seeks applicants who are interested in learning about human beings and Okinawa, who strive to improve as individuals and human beings, and who possess the following qualities:

Department Characteristics

The department trains professionals who will use their thorough global perspectives and knowledge of Okinawa's history, culture, and society, in order to discover new possibilities for the future.

- 3. Students acquire a wide range of knowledge concerning the structure of human society and civilization.

- 7. Students become professionals who can detect and solve problems.

Curriculum Summary

The most important aspect of the curriculum is its holistic approach to teaching about the Ryukyu Islands (Amami, Okinawa, Miyako, and Yaeyama), including how people have lived through history, what kind of society and culture they have formed, and the current social realities of living on the islands today. To this end, the department has established four divisions (archeology and prehistory, history, folk culture and anthropology, and sociology and peace studies) with seven specialized seminars. A second important characteristic of the curriculum is its emphasis on education through specialized seminars, which students take for each of their four years. In their freshman seminars, students learn the proper ways and methods for learning and pursuing research at university. In the sophomore, junior, and senior seminars, students progressively deepen their specialized knowledge in one of the department's divisions. Especially during their junior seminars, students carry out field work in various regions of Okinawa (in some cases, outside the prefecture or overseas), so that they can acquire an understanding of Okinawa based on actual experience—and become leaders of an Okinawa and a Japan rooted in Asia and the world.






Admission Policy (Acceptance of New Students)

- 2. Applicants who have specific skills and abilities that can be put to use in the field of social welfare, and who have promising outlooks for university performance and future careers.
- 3. Applicants who earnestly desire to participate in international assistance activities, especially in the Asia-Pacific region.



The Social Welfare Major in the Department of Human Welfare provides practical education focusing on the workplace to nurture talented individuals who possess compassion and the ability to work in the fields of welfare, medicine, health, and education.

Characteristics of the Major

Students acquire the necessary knowledge, skills, and sensitivity needed to deal with current issues of society.

- 1. Students are trained to work as professionals in the field of social welfare.
- 2. Students are offered a rich educational program for becoming a Certified Social Worker or Psychiatric Social Worker.
- 3. Students receive comprehensive support in acquiring certificates related to social
- 4. Students learn through practical experience during social welfare training and volunteer activities.
- 5. Students are encouraged to acquire international outlooks through overseas training in social welfare.
- 6. Students work on their graduation theses while considering actual practices.







Curriculum Summary

Nowadays, social welfare workplaces require interaction and cooperation with people in medicine, health, politics, community care, and business. The Social Welfare Major offers a wide range of specialized subjects related to social welfare, medical welfare, community-based welfare, international welfare, mental health, and welfare skills, in order to train professionals who can collaborate with other specialists. In addition, the major offers numerous specialized seminars for students to gain practice and training during each of their four years. The seminars utilize the teacher's expertise in fields such as medical welfare, child and family welfare, international welfare, disability studies, town planning, children's mental health, contemporary sociology, social philosophy, and theories of caring. The major also offers specialized training with practice in the field for students who wish to become certified social workers or psychiatric social workers. At the same time, the curriculum allows students to systemically acquire the skills, knowledge, and way of thinking required in the field of social welfare, through practical activities and international contributions.

The Department of Human Welfare Counseling Major, in accord with Okinawa International University's admission policy, seeks applicants who are interested in the human mind, who will work hard to improve as individuals and human beings, and who possess the following qualities:

- 1. Applicants with a desire to learn about the human mind, human behavior, and human relationships from a scientific point of view.
- 2. Applicants who were enthusiastically involved in activities or who possess expertise in areas related to their future university studies, and who have a sincere and positive attitude about wanting to practically apply psychological knowledge and skills in their future careers or everyday lives.



Learn about the workings of the mind and gain a deeper understanding of human beings!

The Counseling Major offers a comprehensive study of the workings of the human mind, examined from various perspectives. Through the four-year program, students learn to develop a psychological perspective, which is to say, they learn to connect with the feelings of people with various ways of thinking, and to consider issues together with them, while also understanding the invisible workings of the mind from a scientific point of view. During each year of the program, students work under the intimate guidance of their professors to acquire a basic understanding of the fundamentals and applications in various fields of psychology. After acquiring this knowledge, students are divided into three courses that match their individual career design goals, so they can pursue a more specialized and practical study of psychology appropriate for their future careers.





Characteristics of the Major

The Major trains students to develop the intellectual insight to think and act based on a sensitive understanding of how society is shaped by the workings of the mind.

- 1. Students receive training to work in psychology-related professions.
- 2. Students are actively supported in designing careers that utilize psychology.
- 3. Students are given comprehensive support in acquiring related certifications.
- 4. Students receive practical training rooted in the local community.
- 5. Students are provided meaningful educational content that emphasizes practical training activities, such as psychological evaluations, psychological testing, and clinical interviews.

Curriculum Summary

During their first two years, students complete a general curriculum, in which they acquire a basic understanding of psychology and the skills for studying at university. When they enter their third year, students choose one of the following three courses, based on their career design (a life plan focusing on work): the Career-Focused Practical Psychology Course, the Psychology Specialist Course, or the Certified Public Psychologist Course.

Graduate School



Philosophy and Aims

The Graduate School of Regional Culture is comprised of three departments: the Department of Ryukyuan Culture, the Department of British and American Studies, and the Department of Human Welfare. The graduate school aims to train highly specialized professionals with the ability to effectively analyze and come up with solutions for the increasingly complicated problems facing local and global communities.

As a place of retraining and lifelong learning, the graduate school also strives to be responsive to the needs of working professionals aiming for self-realization through a lifetime of self-training and reeducation. At the same time, the graduate school hopes to help create a society where the results of those efforts can be put to use.

Research on a specific regional culture leads to comparisons with other regional cultures, and examining things from a broad perspective allows one to have an objective view of one's self and others. This in turn leads to a deeper understanding of those with different values and positions. In a society where many cultures and languages coexist and where values have become increasingly more diverse, research based on a knowledge of one's own and other regional cultures will surely lead to major contributions in the creation of our future community.

Department of Ryukyuan Culture

Language and Culture

In the Division of Language and Culture, students pursue research on Japan's classical literature, modern literature, and language education, focusing especially on the language and literature of Japan's southern island region. Major goals include the acquisition of advanced licenses and qualifications, such as specialized teacher's licenses, and the further education of government workers and the general public.

Folk Culture

The Division of Folk Culture also focuses on researching the southern island region, but with emphasis placed on connections with surrounding regions, such as East Asia and Southeast Asia. The curriculum and lecture content delve deeply into an examination of folk culture in the southern islands, while expanding into an exploration of surrounding regions.

Prehistory, History, and Culture

In the Division of Prehistory, History, and Culture, students conduct research in one of two major areas: (1) archeology, focused on prehistoric culture in the southern island region, with an emphasis on comparative studies with surrounding regions such as East Asia and Southeast Asia; or (2) southern island history, with an emphasis on reading early-modern manuscripts and tracing the transmission of 20th century documents, in order to deepen one's understanding of the history of the southern islands.

Society and Culture

The Division of Society and Culture takes a sociological approach in examining the characteristics of social relations in the southern island regions and cultural problems that are mechanisms for perpetuating social structures. The division also examines the basic structure of southern island society, human development, and ways of dealing with actual social problems.

Department of British and American Language and Culture

British and American Literature

In the Division of British and American Literature, students research the novels, poetry, and plays of the English-speaking world, with a focus on British and American literature. The division also offers subjects on British and American culture, primarily taught in English.

Language Education

The Division of Language Education conducts research on English language education and Japanese as a second language education, while exploring the connections between language, culture, education, and society. The division also considers language education from practical and diverse perspectives, including practical training in language education and multilingual education.

Department of Human Welfare

Social Welfare

The Division of Social Welfare trains professionals who can use the scientific method to clarify the actual conditions of various contemporary social problems, and then devise policies for solving those problems, based on the theories and values of social welfare. The curriculum allows students to thoroughly study the principles of social welfare studies and the theories of social work, while delving more deeply into areas of expertise matching their own interests. Students are not only limited to social issues in Okinawa but can also pursue research focusing on issues of global concern. Thoroughly analyzing social structures requires a broad range of knowledge, so some students take classes in other departments and at other universities. In this way, the department provides an environment that allows each and every student to broadly and deeply pursue their research goals.

Clinical Psychology

The Division of Clinical Psychology primarily aims to train specialists capable of concretely and practically handling issues of the human mind from a position of expertise. With this goal in mind, the division offers a curriculum that allows students to acquire a wealth of specialized knowledge based on theory and practice, centering on subjects required for training clinical psychologists, with instruction that cultivates practical skills. The division offers a curriculum that has been prescribed under the Certified Public Psychologist Act, and has been designated a graduate school (Type 1) that fulfills the eligibility requirements for taking the Clinical Psychologist Certification Exam carried out by the Foundation of the Japanese Certification Board for Clinical Psychologists. After completing this division's program, students are eligible to take the National Certified Public Psychologist Exam and the Clinical Psychologist Exam.

Philosophy and Aims

The Department of Regional Business and Economics in the Graduate School of Regional Business and Economics was established in 1998 with the philosophical aim of refining the spirit of entrepreneurship which can create new possibilities in the areas of economics and commercial science. Specifically, the department was established in order to train businesspersons, researchers, and educators who can play an active role in the local community, by forming a base that combines the functions of human resource development and research, with the following goals: (1) to train highly specialized professionals who can bring their expertise and comprehensive knowledge to fruition in the real world, and who can become the driving force behind local industrial development; and (2) to further promote research activities based on organic cooperation in the fields of economics, business administration, marketing, accounting, and information science. Consequently, the graduate school offers an interdisciplinary curriculum with the primary goal of training professionals who can perform as specialists in business and government.

Department of Regional Business and Economics

Regional Socio-Economic Systems

Today's socio-economic system in Japan requires great change. The Division of Regional Socio-Economic Systems aims to understand the local community as a total system from the perspective of local decentralization, sovereignty, and autonomy, in order to thoroughly understand the construction of the local socio-economic system.

Environmental Economics

The Division of Environmental Economics investigates the possibilities of sustainable economic development that eases the tension between the environment and the economythat is, the trade-off that arises when one is sacrificed to give priority to the other. As part of that investigation, students learn about the assessment of environmental economic value. including techniques, basic theories, and surveys.

Marketing

The Division of Marketing focuses on empirical research on tourism businesses, area marketing, local branding, and local consumer behavior. The division helps students acquire the knowledge and analytical ability needed to analyze the local market, from local and international perspectives.



Industrial Organization

The Division of Industrial Organization focuses on theoretical, empirical, and policy-related research with the goal of providing students with insights and practical skills related to changes in the socio-economic system and trends in industrial organization.

Applied Econometrics

The Division of Applied Econometrics concentrates on research on the analyses of economics and social information using the methods of econometrics and various techniques of statistical analysis, with the goal of finding applications to the real world. The division aims to train students to acquire and strengthen the ability to provide logical analysis and to present the grounds for decision-making, two skills required in the business workplace.

Comparative Management

The Division of Comparative Management focuses on clarifying the direction and character of Japanese corporate strategies, through a comparative analysis of corporate management in various countries during this period of economic globalization. The division aims to provide students with insight and analytical ability concerning management, especially from the perspective of effectively utilizing human resources, while also strengthening their spirit of entrepreneurship.

Okinawan Economics

The Division of Okinawan Economics focuses on theoretical and empirical research on Okinawa's economy, which has a unique history and socio-economic structure quite different from the rest of Japan. By pursuing such research, students learn about methods of economic analysis and acquire economic reasoning skills.

Community Development

A community is an area of homogeneity or that shares similar social phenomena and current events. In analyzing the local Okinawa community, the analysis needs to be extended to Asia and the world. In the Division of Community Development, students scientifically analyze economic and social trends from the perspective of the local community, in order to discover underlying principles and to strengthen their insights and practical skills.

Accounting

The Division of Accounting researches the relationship between tax law (the Corporate Tax Act) and financial accounting. In particular, the division deals with the role and basic issues of tax accounting, especially in dealing with the connection between taxable income and company profits. The division also offers accounting subjects, such as Bookkeeping and Financial Statement Accounting, which can help exempt students from the Certified Public Tax Accountant Examination

Philosophy and Aims

Globalization has been advancing in politics, economics, and many other fields. As a result, orderly development in the twenty-first century can no longer be accomplished merely through the efforts of individual nations. On the other hand, Japan now faces stagnation in confronting problems related to its national finance, industry, labor, declining birth rate, and pension fund. Given this situation, the role that graduate schools fulfill as intellectually creative institutions has become increasingly more important. The Graduate School of Law aims to play a role in fulfilling this responsibility in the field of law by training professionals who can demonstrate outstanding leadership and who can respond shrewdly and flexibly during this period of chaos.

Department of Law

Public and Basic Law

The Division of Public and Basic Law deals with positive laws, such as the Constitution, administrative law, and international law, and the philosophy of basic law. Students study the present state of public law, which determines the relationship between the nation and its citizens, as well as the ideological, historical, and social premises that underlie that law.

Civil and Criminal Law

The Division of Civil and Criminal Law deals with the substantive laws of civil law, commercial law, and criminal law, as well as the procedural laws of the Code of Civil Procedure and the Code of Criminal Procedure. Students systemically study the law while comparing precedents and doctrines concerning the interpretation of laws both in Japan and abroad, so that they can come up with judicial solutions by applying existing laws to specific cases.

My Wonderful Time in Okinawa

I was a teenager who loved Japanese drama when I fell in love with the sound of the Japanese language. When I started studying Japanese at the University of Rennes 2, I loved it even more. My goal (and also my dream) was to come to Japan as fast as possible. It was during a meeting with students who had returned from Japan that I decided to come to Okinawa. The students who returned from Okinawa were able to speak Japanese very well, so that became my motivation.

I stayed in Okinawa for one year, from September 2018 to August 2019, and that was the most beautiful year of my life. I had nothing to worry about: OKIU, especially OKIU's Global Education Support Center, takes very good care of students, and provided me with the chance to discover Okinawan culture (Eisa dance and music is something very incredible) and the Okinawan way of living on this beautiful island (the Pacific Ocean became my favorite ocean). I really enjoyed my classes, too! I had Japanese language classes every day, and I had English, Spanish, karate, calligraphy, and badminton classes, too. I was surprised in a positive way at the relationships between students and teachers, which is friendlier than in France. I became very close friends with students I met in those classes, and I spent a lot of my free time with them, too. Some of them even came to see me in France last year!

What I learned most during my time in Okinawa was obviously the Japanese language. I learned to speak with my friends and Okinawan people about many subjects that I didn't expect to understand or speak about when I first arrived on the island. Living in a strange country far away from my family and friends made me a stronger person, and I learned a lot about myself,

I am now in a master's degree program preparing to become a French teacher for foreign students, and I want to teach French in Japan someday. Will I be able to return to Okinawa? I really hope so!

Global Education Support Center

Providing comprehensive support for international students

OKIU's Global Education Support Center helps to run official exchanges between OKIU and its partner universities, and offers a variety of services to international students enrolled at the university. The Center has a warm and friendly atmosphere, and its doors are always open to students and teachers in need of assistance or who want to get involved in international exchange.



The Global Education Support Center provides the following support for all of OKIU's international students:

- Scholarship information
- Student visa assistance
- Confirmation of enrollment and attendance
- Assistance with preparing attendance certificates and other documents
- International exchange events and programs
- Advice on school and personal matters

International students at OKIU are free to get advice on any problems they encounter while living in Japan, either in their studies or in their private lives.



In addition, the Center holds a variety of events throughout the year, so that international students have many opportunities to interact with and become friends with their Japanese classmates.



The International Exchange Lounge is a pleasant and friendly place for OKIU's foreign and Japanese students to interact and become friends



Language Study Programs for International Students

◆ Language Peers Program

The Language Peers Program matches students with partners who meet their language goals and needs, regardless of nationality, school year, or department. Started in 2018, the program has many international student participants, many of whom teach their native language in exchange for being taught Japanese. International students who want a partner to support them in their Japanese studies, or who want to have some positive interaction with their Japanese classmates, should participate in the Language Peers Program.





Preparation Classes for Language Certification Exams

The Center also offers test preparation classes for various language certification exams. The classes are free to any currently enrolled OKIU student. Current classes include exam preparation classes for nine different languages, including Chinese, Korean, Spanish, French, German, and English. Classes to prepare for the Japanese-Language Proficiency Test (JLPT) are held every year, so international students who want to pass are encouraged to take these free classes.

Speech Contests

Each year, the Center sponsors on-campus speech contests in six different languages: English, Korean, Chinese, French, Japanese (as a foreign language), and Ryukyuan. Most international students participate in the annual Japanese Speech Contest to demonstrate the results of their Japanese study.





Language Camps

During the language camps, students stay at OKIU's Higashi Village Seminar House for a few days immersed in the language they are studying. Camp activities include group study, skits, games, cooking, and generally having loads of fun. Language camps currently include Chinese, French, Korean, English, and German camps. Students from all years and departments can participate, so the camps are a great way to make new friends, while also improving your language skills.

CALL classrooms

CALL (Computer-Assisted Language Learning) is a computerized language learning system that provides an optimal environment for individualized instruction and self-study. The university also provides an LMS (Learning Management System) for off-campus learning. OKIU has four CALL classrooms, which are equipped with a total of 204 computers (including 4 computers for the visually impaired) for the purpose of learning foreign languages, including English, German, French, Chinese, Korean, Spanish, and Japanese. The CALL classrooms are mainly used for classes, but students can also use the classrooms for self-study at their own pace.

- The applicant possesses a Status of Residence of "Student" for the purpose of entering a university or studying in Japan.
- The applicant scored 200 or above on the Examination for Japanese University Admission (EJU).
- The applicant passed Level N2 or above on the Japanese-Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).
- The applicant scored 400 or above on the Business Japanese Proficiency Test (BJT).
- * Applications cannot be submitted from outside Japan. * Support for acquiring a visa is not provided.

Applications are accepted in early January and selection examinations are held in late January. The application forms and entrance exam fee must be submitted in person. The application cannot be submitted by a representative or by mail.

Application Materials

- Graduation certificate or diploma
- Transcript from Japanese language school (if applicable)
- Residence card (with a Status of Residence of "Student")
- Copy of the applicant's passport
- Proof of the applicant's Japanese language ability
- Other documents that OKIU may require

The selection results are announced in early March. If accepted, the applicant should submit all required enrollment materials before the submission deadline.

Admission Guide (Entrance Examination Guide) for International Students

International students applying to enter Okinawa International University should follow these guidelines:

Before You Apply

- The applicant must possess or be able to acquire a Status of Residence of "Student."
- The applicant must show proof of Japanese language proficiency (by submitting JLPT or EJU scores).
- The applicant must have completed 12 years of overseas schooling or the equivalent.
- The applicant should understand that classes (reading, writing, listening, and speaking) will be conducted in Japanese.

Application Requirements

- The applicant should have foreign nationality.
- The applicant has thoroughly read and adequately understood Okinawa International University's admission policies.
- The applicant has completed 12 years of overseas schooling or the equivalent.
- The applicant possesses or can acquire a Status of Residence of "Student" for the purpose of entering a university or studying in Japan, as prescribed under the Immigration Control and Refugee Recognition Act.
- The applicant must satisfy at least one of the following two language requirements:
- 1) The applicant must score over 220 on the Nihongo subject test and over 100 on the Sogo Kamoku subject test of the Examination for Japanese University Admission (EJU).
- 2) The applicant must pass Level N2 or above for the Japanese-Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).
- **Concerning the EJU and JLPT, applicants should take the tests on one of the dates listed on the Entrance Exam Guide.

Selection Process

- For those who submit EJU score results, the decision on acceptance will be made based on the applicant's EJU score, screening of the application documents, and an interview conducted by the relevant department.
- For those who submit the result of the JLPT, the decision on acceptance will be made based on the applicant's JLPT Level of N2 or above, on a written test conducted by OKIU (the applicant can take the test in Japanese or English), screening of the application documents, and an interview conducted by the relevant department.

Career Support

Company Briefings and Employment Exam Information Sessions

Companies visit the OKIU campus for briefing sessions about their hiring goals and practices. The Career Support Center also holds on-campus information sessions about civil service and teacher employment exams.



Job-Related Information and Materials

In addition, the Library regularly holds library guidance for undergraduate and graduate students, and offers lectures on topics such as searching for sources and writing academic papers, so that library users can more efficiently gather materials.

Foreign Book Collection

To respond to a wide range of research and study needs, the OKIU university offers users access to EBSCOhost, SpringerLink, Emerald Publishing's eJournal collections, and other services, providing access to millions of academic documents and materials.



Group Study Rooms - 2nd Floor

Students can study in separate rooms, where they can talk with friends or classmates.



Foreign Book Collection

To support research and study in foreign languages, the OKIU library houses approximately 5,000 foreign books and has back issues for about 6,000 periodicals. The library also accepts requests for books that patrons wish to have purchased.
